GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Aerial: of, relating to, or occurring in the air. **Bypass:** a channel carrying a fluid around a part and back to the main stream.

CCTV: closed-circuit television.
Chaos: a state of utter confusion.
Debris: something discarded like trash.

Devious: deceptive, evil. **Discharged:** to unload.

Dislodges: to force out of a secure or settled position. **Easement:** an interest in land owned by another that

entitles its holder to a specific limited use.

Fatbergs: a large mass of fat and solid waste that collects in a sewer system.

Formidable: causing fear or dread. **Gruesome:** inspiring horror or repulsion. **Havoc:** great confusion and disorder.

Haywire: being out of order or having gone wrong.

Horsetail: a mass of roots.

Inception: an act, process, or instance of beginning.

Lurking: to lie in wait in a place of concealment especially for an evil purpose.

Nemesis: a formidable opponent.

Nuisance: one that is annoying, unpleasant, or obnoxious. **Overflow:** to fill a space to capacity and spread beyond its limits. **Phase:** a distinguishable part in a course, development, or cycle.

Preventative: devoted to or concerned with preventing

something from happening

Pump Station: a place where pumps are located to lift wastewater to higher elevations.

Recruit: to enlist as a member of an organization. **Rodder:** a specialized vehicle that is used to maintain

the sewer system.

Sewer System: a group of underground pipes that carry wastewater.

Stockpiled: a gradually accumulated reserve of something.

Thwart: to oppose successfully.

Treatment Plant: a place where sewage is cleaned so that it is not harmful or

dangerous to the environment.

Untreated Sewage: wastewater that has not

been cleaned at a treatment plant.

VacCon: a specialized vehicle that is used to maintain the sewer system.

Villains: a deliberate scoundrel, or criminal.

Wastewater: water that has been used. It includes substances such as human waste, food scraps, oils, soaps, and chemicals.

NSD was chartered in 1925, has 39 pump stations, over **235 miles** of sewer pipelines & an 800-acre reclamation facility.

SASM has 9 miles of sewage pipes, 3.5 miles of force mains and 6 pump stations. SEWER

SD5 has 24 pump stations, two treatment plants and 34 miles of sewer lines.

SASM is made up of 6 Member Agencies. They are the City of Mill Valley, Tamalpais Community Services District, Almonte Sanitary District, Alto Sanitary District, Homestead Valley Sanitary District,

Central Marin Sanitation Agency (CMSA) Novato Sanitary District (NSD)

Las Gallinas Valley Sanitary District (LGVSD)

Sewerage Agency of Southern Marin (SASM)

Sausalito Marin City Sanitary District (SMCSD)

Sanitary District No. 5 of Marin County

has 10 pump stations, maintains four pump stations for the City of Sausalito and 20 miles of sewer pipelines.

WTAMC is an acronym for the six Wastewater **Treatment Agencies** of Marin County.

44. Fathergs are rock-like masses of waste matter found in a sewer system formed by the combination of fats, oils, and grease and non-flushable materials such as wet wipes and rags.

Marin County created Sanitary District #5 on March 22, 1922. Sanitary District #5's main function was garbage collection until the late 1940's when the effect of dumping untreated sewage into the bay became a topic of interest.

 An aerial pipeline is a sewer main that crosses creeks and streams above ground.

LGVSD has 28 pump stations, 105 miles sewer pipelines.

The amount of wastewater

discharged daily from the 6 wastewater treatment agencies of Marin County can fill 232 Million soda bottles (16 oz. size)



The average person flushes the toilet 2,500 times per year!

CMSA is a Joint Powers Agency formed in 1979 comprised of San Rafael Sanitary District, Ross Valley Sanitary District, Sanitary District No. 2 and the City of Larkspur. CMSA became operational in January 1985.
