The date of this letter will serve as Notice of Award of a contract for the Chemical Storage Facilities Coating Project to Top Line Engineers for the total bid price of \$105,000. The following documents are required to be received and approved by CMSA within 15 calendar days:

- 1. <u>00500 Agreement</u> Sign and send two copies of the attached Agreement. A copy of the fully executed agreement will be returned to Top Line Engineers for your records.
- 2. <u>00610 Faithful Performance Bond</u> Provide a performance bond in an amount not less than 100% of the Contract amount using the form provided in Section 00610.
- 3. <u>00620 Payment Bond</u> Provide a payment bond in an amount not less than 100% of the Contract amount using the form provided in Section 00620.
- 4. <u>Insurance Documentation</u> Provide evidence of insurance meeting the requirements described in Section 00800 of the contract documents.

After all of the documents are approved, CMSA will execute the Agreement and issue a Notice to Proceed establishing the contract start date. We will then schedule a pre-construction meeting to review the construction schedule, safety requirements, and other construction coordination items.

This Project is subject to compliance monitoring and enforcement by the Department of Industrial Relations (DIR) pursuant to Labor Code section 1771.4. The assigned DIR Project ID is 249870. Top Line Engineers shall comply with the DIR's Electronic Certified Payroll Reporting (eCPR) database requirements.

As you may know, the Governor signed S.B. 866 (see <u>http://leginfo.legislature.ca.gov/faces/billTextClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180SB866</u>) on June 27, 2018, and it went into effect immediately. See below an explanation we've prepared of the main highlights of the bill.

Pursuant to S.B. 866, going forward, we will not submit to you copies of the membership/COPE authorization cards employees have signed. Instead, we will send you periodic electronic reports that indicate changes in employees' status, such as sign-ups to be a member, sign-ups for COPE deduction, resignations of membership, etc.

I, Lisa Bui, Membership Supervisor hereby certify that the Union possesses and will maintain an authorization (for dues deductions and/or voluntary political contribution deductions, as indicated) signed by the individuals from whose salary or wages the deduction is to be made.

Through this email, we are giving you express permission to include in the New Hire packet a copy of our membership authorization form, *provided* that has been your practice in the past. We will be updating our membership form and will send that to you directly later this week. We ask that employees be instructed to return the signed forms directly to us. But in the event you receive them from employees, we ask that you promptly send the signed cards directly to us, so we can update our records and include that employee in the next electronic report we send you.

Finally, if you receive a request from a third party for contact and/or identifying information of SEIU Local 1021 bargaining unit members i.e. names/work location/contact information, etc., please notify the respective Field Representative immediately, send me a copy of the request, and do not respond to the request until SEIU Local 1021 has an opportunity to weigh in.

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Explanation of S.B. 866:

Important California Legislation That Mitigates Some Impacts of the Janus Decision

On June 27, 2018, Governor Jerry Brown signed Senate Bill 866 ("SB 866"). It became effective immediately.

This California law makes significant changes to public sector payroll deductions, a public employer's communication to employees regarding the right to join/support a Union, access by Unions to new employee orientations of public

employees, and clarifies that public employers cannot deter or discourage either employees or job applicants from joining or remaining members of the Union or authorizing dues or fee deductions to an employee organization.

Payroll Deductions:

SB 866 amends various provisions of the Education Code and Government Code to require public employers to honor a public employee's written authorization for deductions from his or her earnings to be transmitted to the Union. It provides:

- The employer must honor the terms of the employee's authorization, for example any terms of a membership and deduction authorization card the Union has supplied the employee. The employee can only revoke the authorization pursuant to the terms of the authorization s/he signed.
- Deductions must start the pay period after the employer receives notification of the authorization.
- Requests to authorize dues/other deduction must be directed to the Union rather than an employer. Requests to revoke or change the authorization must also be directed to the Union rather than an employer. An employer must rely on the Union's explanations regarding whether authorization/revocation/change in deductions has been requested by the employee.
- A Union need not provide an employer a copy of the employee's authorization unless a dispute arises about the existence or terms of the authorization.
- A Union must indemnify the employer for any claims made regarding such deductions.

Employer Communication about Employee's Right to Join/Support Unions:

SB 866 also added provisions regarding a public employer's communications with employees regarding their right to join or support a Union, or not do so. Specifically, SB 866 provides:

- An employer must meet and confer with the exclusive bargaining representative prior to issuing a mass communication to its employees or applicants regarding the rights of employees to join or support a Union, or not do so.
- If the parties cannot come to agreement on content of the employer's proposed mass communication, and the employer wishes to go forward with the mass communication, the employer must include the Union's communication (of reasonable length) too, simultaneously.

AB 119 Clean Up and/or Expansion:

SB 866 also expands the current law (AB 119) that gives public sector Unions the right to participate in new employee orientations by:

- Extending coverage of AB 119 to transit employees who were previously excluded.
- Prohibiting employers from disclosing the date/time/place of the new employee orientation to anyone other than employees, the exclusive bargaining representative, and a vendor who is contracted to provide a service at the new employee orientation.

SB 285 Clean Up and/or Expansion:

Finally, SB 866 extends the existing language of SB 285 to job applicants.

SB 866 prohibits a public employer from deterring or discouraging employees *or applicants* from becoming or remaining members of a Union, or from authorizing a Union to represent them or from authorizing membership status/dues deduction.

The June 2018 monthly self-monitoring report for the Central Marin Sanitation Agency (CMSA) treatment plant has been submitted using the eSMR /California Integrated Water Quality System (CIWQS). This SMR conforms to CMSA's NPDES Permit, Order #R2-2018-003.

Violations

There are no reportable NPDES Permit violations for this reporting period.


Blending Events

The CMSA treatment facility did not exceed the maximum secondary capacity of 30 MGD. No blend events occurred during this monitoring period.

Data Validation

All regulatory daily, weekly, and monthly quality control calibrations/checks conducted during the month of June met established quality assurance acceptance criteria. During this monitoring period, semiannual, quarterly and permit sampling was conducted for influent, effluent and biosolids sampling locations. Reports for these sampling events have been included for influent and effluent sampling locations. As indicated in last month's self-monitoring report, CMSA was waiting on analytical results for biosolids which were not been included within that report. Semiannual analytical results for biosolids have been provided within this monthly self-monitoring report.

Dear Dr. Rauch-Williams:

Central Marin Sanitation Agency (CMSA) is very interested in supporting the Carollo/Georgia Tech team in the Water Research Foundation (WRF) project to characterize and test contamination of source separated organic (SSO) feedstocks. CMSA has a public/private partnership with the local solid waste company, Marin Sanitary Service (MSS), called the Central Marin Food-to-Energy Program. MSS collects pre-consumer food waste from about 190 restaurants and markets in its service area, pre-processes the material, and then delivers it to CMSA for co-digestion.

CMSA understands that the co-digestion of food waste has raised questions in the wastewater industry about the acceptable quality of this material to avoid or minimize negative effects on treatment plant operations, mechanical equipment, and final biosolids quality. Issues may include corrosion, clogging of pipes and pumps, digestion inhibition, and/or contamination of the final biosolids products.

This WRF project will also develop practical guidance for Water Resource Recovery Facilities (WRRFs) for the characterization of SSO feedstock. This involves parameters that can affect the operation and process performance of digestion, solids yield, biosolids dewaterability, energy recovery, and other treatment processes that a WRRF may employ.

Specifically, below are the objectives of the project:

- 1. Identify relevant contaminants and contamination levels in SSO feedstock.
- 2. Develop industry guidance for characterizing source SSO feedstocks and slurries.
- 3. Develop critical analytical methods and standardize sampling protocols for rapid monitoring and screening.



- 4. Explain the impacts of these parameters on the operation of WRRFs.
- 5. Develop minimum feedstock quality standards for various product goals.

In this context, we welcome the very timely involvement of the WRF with this project to help advance our understanding of the SSO feedstock quality on operations and final biosolids quality. The project approach will provide needed industry guidance.

To support this project, we will provide an in-kind contribution of up to \$7,000 for the following activities:

- Participation in a survey on experiences of our Agency with SSO feedstock use, quality concerns, contamination, analysis practices, and needs (in support of Phase 1 of this study).
- Review of project deliverables and reports to provide feedback and help for directing the project outcomes towards the highest value for industry practitioners.

Details and extent of the exact services will be further defined by the Carollo/Georgia Tech team at the time of the study. We look forward to working with the WRF and you on this important project. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me at 415-459-1455, extension 145.

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MARK KOEKEMOER

Laboratory Director, Central Marin Sanitation Agency

Mark Koekemoer finds laboratory work very fulfilling. "It is not just a day job where you collect a paycheck. It is an opportunity where you can go home to your family and feel good about what you have accomplished," he says.

"We are supporting the greater industry, providing data for operators to use, identifying trouble spots, giving regulatory guidance, and monitoring how we are doing on our discharge (to the receiving stream).

"I love the daily challenge of it all," he adds. "Despite our weekly or monthly plans, there is always something in flux and we adjust accordingly. We are always looking for improvements, always searching for more proficient and cost efficient opportunities."

Mark came to the U.S. from South Africa, studied at Texas A&M University, and got involved in laboratory work as a temp with Kelly Scientific and then at the Napa Sanitation District before joining the Central Marin Sanitation Agency (CMSA) as Laboratory Director.

He has been involved in the development of the proposed new Environmental Laboratory Approval Program (ELAP) standards, representing small laboratories on ELTAC (Environmental Laboratory Technical Advisory Committee). "An ELAP overhaul was needed," he says. "Inspections, documentation, auditor training, the certification program were falling short of its intent. The certification system needed improvement. Although we have begun to see some improvement there is still a long way to go. But cost will be a major issue, and the new standards will require more time and additional documentation."

Mark with the support of his laboratory staff has also been instrumental in development and incorporation of new methods of testing, namely Luminescent Dissolved Oxygen (LDO) and Colilert, which is used for Total Coliform analysis in recycled waters.

"Many laboratories have sought Mark out for his knowledge of regulatory compliance as it pertains to laboratory applications and other requirements such as National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permits (NPDES)," says Brian Thomas, CMSA technical services director who nominated him. "He has also served on various joint task groups for Standard methods and was instrumental in supporting the LDO technology within its implementation. Mark has continued to support the laboratory community by leading the implementation of new technologies within the wastewater field with respect to the Colilert method approved use for recycled waters.

"He is a valued team member of CMSA and his leadership within our community is appreciated." 📎
